
## **Woodpeckers®**

PRECISION WOODWORKING TOOLS
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- 1. Layout the location of the router plate opening. Draw a 9-1/4" x 11-3/4" rectangle.
- 2. Position the Insert Template over the rectangle and clamp in place. Keep the clamps as close to the ends of the template as possible to allow room for the router. Figure A
- 3. Set your router bit (pattern type with bearing on shank as shown) to protrude slightly more than 3/8". (.400" to be exact).
- 4. Route a groove all the way around the inside edge of the template. It is easier to make multiple shallow passes. Make sure to make a couple clean up passes to ensure all the stock has been removed. Figure B
- 5. Use a jig saw to cut out around the inside edge of the island to leave a 1/2" wide lip for the plate to rest on. Figure C
- 6. Use a chamfer bit, file or sand paper to clean up the top inside edge. This is particularly beneficial if your table is laminated
